

## Secretary's Jottings

### Important information and news from the Committee meeting of 11 September 2021.:

1. The Treasurer led a discussion on the finances with particular emphasis on the impact COVID is having on our income.
2. The issue of the pressing need to find a replacement Treasurer was discussed. Members are to be canvassed for a suitable and willing volunteer.
3. We are awaiting the outcome of a number of Grant applications. Information was tabled about the new Super Round of the Gaming Benefit Fund and changes to BCC grants for improvements to facilities. This resulted in considerable discussion about the opportunity for planning for significant improvements to Pine St.
4. Our MiPro microphone system is now operational, having recently been repaired and is now the equivalent of a brand new system with a 3yr warranty.
5. The new Beginner Training Course organized by Mick Pythian is progressing very well.
6. The Training Course for new Convenors has begun and Bob Kennedy reported that this will be an 8 week course held on alternate Thursdays. Three (3) new Convenors are in training.
7. In the light of the cancellation of the August Mt Coot-tha Exhibition the scheduled raffle would go ahead as a stand-alone on-line raffle that will be drawn at the November Mt Coot-tha Exhibition. The 1<sup>st</sup> prize is a lathe donated by Hare & Forbes and 2<sup>nd</sup> prize is the \$300 voucher to purchase timber from Carbatec. All members will be advised of how to access on-line tickets.
8. A Conflict of Interest Policy was adopted.
9. A Conflict and Dispute Resolution Policy was adopted.
10. A draft of two proposed changes to the Constitution were submitted to the meeting and discussed in preparation for the SGM on 16 November.
11. Progress on the development of the new website is now underway with draft pages to be reviewed by the Committee as they become available.
12. The BCC carried out some minor repair work identified as necessary in a recent audit. There is now a Exit bar on the green door of the downstairs workshop and ceiling on the verandah no longer sags. An external Key Box is yet to be installed.
13. The approval by the BCC of the installation of the Events sign on the outside of the building is still pending. Neil Howard has already made the sign a picture of which was tabled.
14. In response to member requests a new Jacobs Chuck has been put into service.

The meeting concluded at 10.05. The next meeting is on 9 October, 2021 commencing at 8am.

## Demonstration – Offset Lattice Lidded Box

On the morning of September 4 Gary Bidgood conducted a demonstration, in the Phil Harris Auditorium, of how he makes his offset turned lattice lid boxes. There were 15 members and friends present and another 5 members accessed the demonstration via Zoom.

Gary used a Robert Sorby Eccentric Chuck System for this project. Details of this device can be found at <https://www.robert-sorby.co.uk/rs60-eccentric-chuck>. The local current price is approximately \$560.

Gary discussed some timbers he had experimented with including Jacaranda, New Guinea Rosewood and Queensland Maple. He recommended the use dense grain timbers. The demonstration was conducted on a blank of Queensland Maple measuring 92 mm square and 75 mm long.

In an effort to reduce the amount of repetition of basic turning tasks Gary had preprepared the blank, i.e. turned it to round and cut it into 2 pieces, and had prepared 2 push chucks, one of which was to be used with a scroll chuck, and the other he had attached to the faceplate that is a component of the Sorby kit.

He mounted a scroll chuck onto the lathe and fitted the push chuck into it. He mounted the lid blank onto it. As he was only allowing for a 3 mm grip, he put 4 dabs of hot glue around the edge for security. He then applied some water to the glue to speed up the setting. Gary turned a spigot on the inside of the lid, using callipers to set the size to that of the box bottom, and removed inside waste. He used a parting tool to square up the spigot sides. Next Gary fitted the push chuck attached to the faceplate into the bottom side of the lid. He adjusted the spigot to achieve a tight fit. He used a little bit of mentholated spirits to speed the melting of the glue holding the lid in place and removed the lid and the attached faceplate from the push chuck. Gary removed the scroll chuck and the push chuck from the lathe.


He mounted the faceplate and lid onto the eccentric chuck and then mounted that onto the lathe set at 0 mm offset. Gary smoothed the face of the lid and sanded it. Then he located and marked the centre point. He removed the toolrest from the lathe and replaced it with a flat top toolrest as seen below. It must be set up parallel with the face of the timber.



He adjusted the eccentric chuck to a 30 mm offset and marked the centre. He marked 4 lines to be cut using a template as a guide. Gary made a series of light cuts along the marked lines. When the 4 cuts had been made he used the lathe's indexing system to rotate the chuck 120 degrees. He repeated the previous process another 2 times. The marking of the last grouping is shown below.



Gary had made the cutting chisel at home using a square section of HSS. The cutting tip is 2.5 mm wide. It has a depth stop with a screw adjustment. Used in conjunction with the flat top toolrest this chisel helps to achieve a square on position for cutting, and depth control to 3 mm.



He removed the lid from the eccentric chuck and removed the chuck from the lathe. Gary mounted the scroll chuck with the push chuck used previously on the lathe. He mounted the lid onto the push chuck face in. He put 4 dabs

of hot glue around the edge for security. He replaced the flat top toolrest with a normal one. He marked a line 3.5 mm inside the rim. He used a skew chisel as a scraper to remove waste and refine the edge. Gary replaced the toolrest with the flat top one. He marked 5 lines separated by 6 mm. He cut along each of these lines, through to the cuts made on top of the lid earlier.



He lightly sanded the cuts. He advised that he would normally go through the grits up to 300 or 400. Those present agreed with Gary that sanding was not a very interesting part of a demonstration. He removed the lid and push chuck from the lathe.

Gary mounted the bottom blank into the scroll chuck so he could work on the face side. He turned a 3 mm shoulder to allow the lid to fit firmly on it. He used a spindle gouge to remove the waste, starting at the centre and working out. He used callipers to mark the diameter required. Next he used a Turnmaster fitted with a box cutter to remove waste and create a bowl shape interior. He sanded the interior. Gary shaped the outside of the box to better match the internal shape. He fitted the lid to the box and used a spindle gouge to refine the shape of the box. Gary noticed some tear out at the lid join. He used a skew chisel to make a V cut at the join. He also refined bottom edge.

Gary gave a brief demonstration of how he tidies up the lattice lid using a Demel fitted with a diamond file bit. This was the end of the demonstration.



The following images are of the demonstration piece at the end of the session. Gary will tidy up some areas as necessary and apply an appropriate finish in his home workshop.

The members present were very appreciative of Gary's demonstration, and gave him a round of applause, and then proceeded to engage him in an informal Q&A session. Thanks very much Gary for another splendid demonstration to

challenge our imaginations and skills. Well done Gary!!!

There was a very interesting discussion on the best way to ensure that flocking was distributed evenly over the inside of a box, another on finishing techniques and the different preferences for oils and waxes, and another on inserts.

Of course, no Show & Tell is complete without a discussion of tools. Charlie Edwards brought along one of his own hollowing creations and a tool rest he had made. These certainly sparked some considerable interest and once again we marveled at Charlie's creativity and ingenuity. Maurie Page brought along a wood plane that he had restored, and another one he had collected along the way. Chris Curtis revealed himself as an enthusiastic collector of these small planes and there ensued quite the discussion on the value and virtues of these items.

The next Show & Tell on 16 October will focus on Christmas ornaments.


