Covid and Masks

Unfortunately, we have had a Covid breakout at WSQ which led the Management Committee to shut the club until Sunday 31 July in an endeavour to prevent any further spread amongst members. The good news is that the infected members appear to have recovered well.

We will reopen on Monday 1 August. However, as previously advised, it has been decided that mask wearing will be mandatory for all members and visitors at WSQ Hall until further notice. Although masks may be removed while eating and drinking, please ensure that it remains in place while queuing up in the kitchen. Please also be diligent with other features of our Covid Safe plan, includina social distancing, hand washing and not attending if you are feeling unwell. These are all important measures in minimising the risk of transmission.

Mask wearing will also be mandatory for WSQ members at external events, including the Mt Coot-tha Exhibition (6-8 August) and Bunnings Sausage Sizzle (Sunday 14 August). We will have masks on hand at Mt Coot-tha to offer to patrons who aren't wearing one.

The Competition Sub-committee was pleased with the level of support with 139 entries across most categories. What surprised the Subcommittee was the lack of an entry in the Pen and Pencil category and only one entry in the Christmas Decoration category. We have a number of turners in the club who have specialised in producing wonderful pieces in both these categories. All woodturners of Pens and Pencils and Christmas Decorations are encouraged to start preparations now for their entries (plural) in the 2023 Competition.

In speaking with the judges after judging was competed, they all expressed the view that the standard and quality of the entries across all categories was excellent in every respect, design, workmanship, finish, etc. Their comments on each entry (judged by two judges acting independently) will be given to each entrant after the presentation of Awards & Trophies.

Resin Workshop - 2 July 2022

On a very cold and wet Saturday morning 9 brave members made the trip to *Natural Edge Timbers* in Corunna Street, Albion to participate in a very informative and enjoyable workshop conducted by Jason Heaton.

Jason had very kindly agreed to host the workshop at no cost to our members in the interests of establishing a relationship with fellow lovers of all things wood. All who attended certainly enjoyed the generous sharing of his knowledge and experience of using resin. His business is primarily concerned with selling a huge range of magnificent slabs of timber, resin, various dyes and pigments and some cut timber and pieces of burl. Pen makers would have a field day with the slices of burl he has on display. He also runs regular 1-day workshops where participants mix resin and pour to into a prepared frame to produce a serving board.

During the workshop Jason demonstrated the most efficient ways of weighing and mixing resin and adding various dyes and pigments. Each of us had the opportunity to mix a pot of resin then separate it into plastic containers and experiment with a whole range of dyes and pigments. There certainly were some colourful combinations produced. We then used the time-lapse facility on our phones to record the 'living' process of the resin transforming itself as it cured.

Upcycling a Dining Room Table

With the help of the Woodturners Society of Qld and Brian Creese, my fiancé and I early this year upcycled a tired old pine table into our lovely, new dining room masterpiece.

After trying to find a store-bought table for months, but unable to find a style or quality we liked, we spotted a table we could upcycle on Gumtree for \$50. With the original owners offloading their items due to a lifestyle change up north, a quick trip to Brendale pursued and with a very snug fit in the Kia the project had begun.



Next on the list was a trip to Bunnings to purchase some Tasmanian Oak which would form the new table top. Approximately 100 cuts later the top started to take shape. Of course, no project is complete without its challenges and 2 nails in the trusty old nail gun gave way. Being a little stingy, the initial thought was to try and do it by hand but after one hit of the hammer it was back to Bunnings for a new nail gun. Best several hundred dollars spent!

To complete our little project, we stumbled across the Woodturners Society of Qld and asked if they could help us turn the ugly square legs into something spectacular. Brian Creese was so generous with his time, turning out 4 perfect legs.

The design of the legs was based on one that we found and liked on the internet. Brian used the photo to prepare a plan, including calculation of diameter and positions of the critical high oints and low points. After turning one leg using the photo-based plan, he sent a photo for our approval. A few days later, he finished the other three legs ready for pick up. Being radiata pine, some of the legs had knots with holes around them, which needed to be filled before painting.

Final steps were a quick sand, filling the nail holes with some coloured wax before applying a lovely oak stain.



We are so happy with the finished product. We don't have all the tools to take it to the next level and it's far from perfect, but we are so happy with the finished product. Each night we sit down to dinner as a family and it reminds us what you can achieve with a bit of imagination and hard work. Along the way I've also fallen in love with the art of woodturning and have completed the beginners training course with amazing conveners, Mick and Paul.
