We participated in the inaugural QUT Sustainability Week market on Tuesday 23 August. Our items on display generated a lot of interest and sales for WSQ.

Bunnings Demonstration

Finally, on Saturday 27 August, we participated in the Bunnings Fathers' Day Drill and Grill event, where we did woodturning demonstrations and had some items on display.

All these external events helped us to promote and expand our presence in the community.

Thanks to everyone who volunteered their time to organise and assist with the above events. Without your valuable contribution we wouldn't be able to do a lot of these events. Whilst on this topic, it's

disappointing that we still see the same small group of members willing to volunteer. An hour or two once or twice a year, would make an enormous difference and relieve the pressure on "the few".

Secretary's Jottings

Meeting held on Saturday, 13 August.

- 1. Apologies were received from Phil Oostenbroek, Alwyn Clark and Mallick Ramlackhan.
- 2. George Wolf was appointed Safety Officer and will attend Committee meetings.
- 3. Harold Wiltshire was invited to the meeting to speak about the new Combination Table Saw that will be purchased with the Grant from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund and funds contributed by WSQ.
- 4. Mike Dunne pointed out that we were still awaiting the outcome of the Grant application to the Men's Shed organization.

- 5. Mike Dunne reported on his attendance at the networking function hosted by Joe Kelly and gave details of the connections made with local community organisations like the Women's Health and Equity Group, Institute of Culinary Excellence and the Westfield Care for Kids.
- 6. There were 9 Applications for Membership that were accepted: Holly Smith, Dominick Clancy, Thomas Hooper, Tim Atkinson, Peter Faulkner, Anthony Zandvliet, Navid Awni, Sue Brown and Jordan Blair.
- 7. The date of the SGM was set for 15 November.
- 8. A review of all aspects of the Competition will be conducted.
- 9. The Mt Coot-tha Exhibition was very successful with approximately \$3,550 added to WSQ's coffers.
- 10. WSQ has accepted the invitation from Bunnings Wecker Rd Mt Gravatt to demonstrate turning and man a stall at their Drill & Grill initiative in the lead up to Father's Day.
- 11. Reg Weber reported that the Accreditation Process was progressing, and Convenors were being consulted for assistance with the process. Neil Howard, a visitor at the meeting, reported that there was an extensive range of coloured dots available for affixing to name badges.
- 12. An electrical audit is to be carried out on Monday 15 August. We are still awaiting the outcome and report of the Fire Audit previously carried out.
- 13. The Hoop Pine, currently in the car park, will be cut into manageable pieces by Bob McGeechan.
- 14. Neil Howard was requested to make a sign to be used to restrict public access to the Car Park when we have a function.
- 15. The issue of the phones at Pine St was discussed, noting that the current handsets are not functioning. John Reed will see to changing the handsets.
- 16. Reg Weber reported that after consultation with Peacocks he is convinced that the blades currently used in the Felder are the most appropriate available. He reported that \$1,130 was spent on replacing and sharpening the Felder blades in 2021 and a similar cost is likely in 2022. This figure was well in excess of the \$470 spent in 2020. There will be further consultation with Convenors on the types and volume of timber being put through the Felder.

The meeting closed at 1.30pm.

Runners up were Rob McGregor's olive bowl with carved rim with 20 votes, Mick Phythian's 'Black Hole' sculptural piece (19 votes), and Lee Wilson's Flower Sculpture with 18 votes.

Lathe for Sale



As I will be downsizing from Kenmore Hills to Tarragindi later in the year, I am looking to sell my old lathe, a Woodfast Hyco model. 4-speed belt change, mounted on purpose-built wooden bench.

It has a swing of 150 mm (i.e. for bowls blanks up to 300 mm diameter), and bed length of 950 mm between centres.
