Management Committee Meeting 13 January, 2024

Meeting Opened at 7.50am

1. The Minutes of the December meeting were presented and accepted.
2. The Inwards Correspondence was accepted, and the Outwards correspondence was endorsed.
3. The December Finance Report was presented noting that the main income for the month was from the Bunnings BBQ on Boxing Day and New Years Eve.
The signatories for the Bank A/cs for 2024 are: Mike Dunne, Alwyn Clark, Binny Willis, and Brian Crease
The Draft of the 2023 Annual Financial Statement was presented to the meeting. Brian Crease will clarify some procedural issues at an appointment with the Auditor.
4. The Membership Report was presented by Alwyn Clark noting that there was one new member – Martin Payne – and one reinstated member – Ben Engedow.
Alwyn Clark reported that there were significant issues with the Database and he is receiving assistance from Ian Symes to rectify the problems. Further investigation of an alternate Database system is being carried out.
5. Workplace Health and Safety – Katherine Ogg reported on the range of water coolers available and some further investigation of purchasing or leasing a system will be done. The issue of the need for good hydration while in the Workshops will be reinforced each Tuesday.
6. Building and Grounds – The current hot water system in the Auditorium is not worth replacing and further investigation of a viable alternative, adequate for our needs, continues.
7. Tools and Equipment - a new Notice Board will be installed in the Auditorium, the issue of a backup for the card machine will be further investigated, new publicity flyers need to be printed.
8. Events – the dates for the forthcoming Bunnings BBQs are 21/01, 17/02, Open Day is 25 May, Plans are underway to have the Competition in 2024 – Entry Forms will need revision to reflect the recommendations of the Review, the ABC Breakfast broadcast will be on 16 January with Katherine Ogg the WSQ spokesperson.
9. The Committee accepted the proposed changes to 2 By Laws as they relate to the procedures for the Election of Committee Members and the Termination of Membership, and the Code of Conduct.

Treasurer's Report

Since my last report in Turning Talk (1 December 2023), WSQ has held three Sausage Sizzles at Bunnings Mt Gravatt (Wecker Road): Boxing Day, New Year's Eve, and Sunday 21 January. Sales on Boxing Day (\$933) were disappointing because of lower than expected number of Bunnings customers and failure of our EFTPOS device early in the day. However, the bank (NAB) gave us \$800 as compensation for loss of business. Total sales were higher on NYE (\$1,612) and 21 January (\$1,914). Total net profit from the three events (including NAB's contribution) was \$4,036. Thank you to all the volunteers on these three days.

The draft (unaudited) financial statement for 2023 shows total income for the year of \$121,340 and expenditure of \$107,864 for a net profit of \$13,476. This figure includes monies from fundraising activities (Bunnings BBQs, container refunds, etc), which have been set aside in a 'Future Fund' to cover future expenditure on major equipment items and building improvements. Full details will be presented at the AGM on 19 March.

The 2024 financial year has started well with income to date of \$5,772 and net profit of \$4,481.

Bandsaw 14 Inch Wheel Tyre Fitting Jig.

Hi everyone. I recently made this jig to fit the rubber tyre to the bandsaw wheels. After researching on the net, I found there were several different ways of doing it including soaking the rubber tyre in boiling water. This did not appeal to me, as I liked the idea of keeping my fingers. Unfortunately, I didn't think of it at the time to take photos of the process until afterwards when I realized how easy it was.

Essentially, I put the PVC tube over the vertical spigot to take up the difference in bore size. I stretched the rubber tyre over a black 9 litre bucket and put in the sun for half an hour. I placed the wheel over the central spigot. I looped the tyre over the angled spigot and fed it onto the wheel and got some tension. Slowly, I turned the wheel ensuring the tyre remained in the wheel groove. When it was completely on the tyre it was still stretched over the angled spigot. At this stage I stood the jig up vertically and feed some contact cement into the groove as I slowly turned the wheel. I didn't need too much glue. When finished, I slipped the chromed steel tube into the gap. Then I laid the jig back down on the bench. With some effort I pulled the wheel up off the vertical spigot whilst ensuring the tyre remained in the groove. Once it was off, I checked the tyre was sitting evenly in the groove. This seemed to be okay, so I slipped out the chrome tube. I cleaned up the excess glue and let it set overnight. Job all done.



Put this process in your memory bank and if you ever need to borrow the jig come and see me. I hope this may be of some help. Cheers.

Strict adherence to the above items can only increase the level of safety for all members. I look forward to our next get together.

How I Made a Vase with a Porthole Feature Ring

In this article I will not be talking about the segmented sections that make up the main part of the vase. To understand that you can take my course on 'Introduction to Segmented Turning'. I am just discussing the feature ring.

The timbers are; Jarrah, Walnut, Lemon Scented Tea Tree and Pine.

I first saw the concept in a DVD put out by Malcolm Tibbets and decided to try it for myself so here is what I did.

The first thing was to look at the Lemon Scented Tea Tree I used for the inside of the portholes. Cut across the log, the Lemon Scented Tea Tree has a beautiful feathery pattern and so the log was cut at 6mm on the bandsaw utilising my log cutting jig to form wafers.

To get the most from the Tea Tree, and also looking at the size of my Forstner bits, the finished part of the Lemon Scented Tea Tree would be 38mm (1 1/2").

Adding 5mm all round for the outside of the tamper and another 5mm to the Pine that the Lemon Scented Tea Tree will be inserted too plus the 4mm 'framing' gave me circumference of this layer with 12 segments ($38+10+4=52$) and so $52 \times 12 = 624$ minimum circumference. This dimension then was used to design the rest of the vase. The design process is part of my course but a portion of the cut list from the Segmented Project Planner is at the end of the article.

Now that I have the design, I cut 12 Pine squares at 52mm and 19mm thick.

The text in the following pictures shows the steps for drilling the 38mm hole for the tamper.




The Tea Tree wafer was then glued to the Pine and another Pine square 6mm thick glues behind that to make a sandwich and the excess trimmed on the bandsaw.



Next the pieces are cut at 15 degrees on each side on the bandsaw and lightly sanded so the pieces will come together as a circle.




This sanding jig for my 12" disc sander is from a Curt Theobald DVD. Curt will be a Turnfest this March 2024.

Back to the lathe to mark the outside diameter of the porthole taper and then turned down to the bottom with a bowl gouge.



Now that these are finished that are glued into a circle with the 4mm 'framing' Walnut between each piece. The rest of the vase is then built around this feature ring.



Some notes on turning the project

The project is built in two parts, one starting from the bottom and the other from the top. I use waste blocks on face plates so the project can be removed from the lathe and returned to the same alignment. Having two pieces allows for the inside of the vase can be turned and finished as I go. The two pieces are then joined near the largest diameter.



Joining the top and bottom together is aided by this live centre which has a No 2 Morse Taper for the live centre and a thread the same of my lathe spindle so that the face plate can be screwed on making for the whole piece to be rotated.



Due to the size the vase was supported with a 3 Point Steady Rest Pro

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
