I need to get an Amazon E-gift card for my niece. It's her birthday today. I tried purchasing it myself but my card got declined. Could you handle this for me and have it sent to her email address? Let me know so I can provide you with her email address. Promise to make a refund once my bank issue is resolved.

The email address had changed from a Bigpond to an outlook email account address. This attempt was basic and easy to identify as a scam.

It is not always easy to spot a con or scam artist. But scammers know how to get around our better judgment. They play on our emotions or promise big payoffs to get us to act. Please remain vigilant.

Mt Coot-Tha Exhibition



Secretary's update

Management Committee Meeting

13 April 2024 - Meeting Opened at 7.33am

Present: Mike Dunne, Alwyn Clark, Binny Willis, Brian Creese, Neil Howard, Bob Kennedy, Reg Weber, John Donaldson, Barry Wilson, David Williams, Katherine Ogg

- 1. The Minutes of the March meeting were presented and passed
- 2. Correspondence for the month was listed and the Incoming correspondence was received and the Outgoing endorsed.
- 3. The Treasurer presented the Finance Report which was accepted and accounts were passed for payment.
 - a notice is to be sent to all members advising of the vacancy in the position of Treasurer as from June.
- 4. The Membership Report was presented by the Membership Secretary, Alwyn Clark who noted that Membership stands at 232. Applications for Membership were accepted from Wade Headley, Chris Smith, Alexander du Plessis and Jim Mitchell.
- 5. The Safety Officer reported 3 Accidents in the workshop, only one of which resulted in a very minor injury requiring a bandaid.
 - The feedback from the practice CPR at the Tuesday morning 'smoko' meeting revealed that regular practice sessions are required.
- The kitchen bench needs some re-modelling to accommodate the side/by/side refrigerator/freezer. The small chest freezer will be offered for sale.
- A massive clean-up of the downstairs timber storage area has been scheduled for 10th May. Timber, surplus to the needs of WSQ, will be offered to Members attending and assisting with the clean-up with the leftovers taken to the dump. A new racking system is to be installed in the downstairs area.
- The new small bandsaw in the upstairs workshop is now operational, though a smaller blade is to be purchased so that bowl blanks can be cut more easily. Reg Weber will investigate the costs of repairing the motor from the old bandsaw.
- 9. Alwyn Clark reported that there was an issue with Camera 1 in the Auditorium during the March demonstration. The issue is to be investigated further.

- 10. Up-coming events were discussed:
 - Open Day on 25th May a few tables are still available to members who wish to sell items, Neil Howard is looking into the possibility of a Teams Turning Event.
 - Competition; forms available on the website
- The Workshop Code of Conduct in relation to Members offering unsolicited advice to turners was discussed and the Policy will be re-enforced at all Workshops.
- 12. Mick Phythian presented some proposals to the Committee:
 - Dan Woodward is prepared to offer Pyrography sessions for decorating bowls, platters, vases etc on the 1st and 2nd Tuesday evening of each month. A Notice requesting Member interest is to be placed on the Noticeboard in the Auditorium.
 - Further investigation of the possibility of the morning of the 1st Thursday of the month being used for a 'Specialist Workshop'.
 - Monday evening Box-making group to be investigated for Member interest and a suitably accredited Instructor.


Treasurer's report

Gross profit in March was \$7,434 and expenses totalled \$3,304, giving net monthly earnings of \$4,130. These figures were underpinned by a very successful Sausage Sizzle at Bunnings on Easter Saturday, 30 March, when our volunteers cooked 45kg sausages and 15kg onions, and sold 15 dozen drinks. Total sales for the day were \$2532, for a net profit of \$1918.

The only notable transactions so far in April are receipt of \$1300 donation from a member to cover the purchase of a water cooler for the downstairs workshop, income of \$875 for member training courses, and payment of \$1206 for a new 14" Hafco bandsaw to replace the aging Carba-Tec one with a burnt out motor.





More Router Rituals - Demo 6th April

Neil Howard – WSQ Committee

I started, (to a smaller audience than usual), with a brief re-cap of some of the topics I had covered in my first demo in November last year.

First, a different way to carve feet on a bowl and take the tenon off – all at once. I use a clear acrylic baseplate (300mm square x 6mm thick) in place of the standard baseplate on a Makita Trim Router. The bowl is positioned on a table, upside down on a soft bag filled with rice. I used to use paving sand in the bag, but have now switched to using rice, (thanks for that tip, Dan).

Most of the waste material can be safely routered away, as the acrylic base is supported on what will become the bottom of the finished feet. I found that if you get too aggressive with a powered sander, and take too much off, it is impossible to put a bit back on! I then use either a' Microplane' tool, or a Japanese 'Shinto' rasp, or hand sanding, to finesse the final shape of the base and feet of the bowl.

Next, I mounted the router into a wooden collar on a much smaller baseplate, which I fixed onto my custom toolpost table. After adjusting the toolpost collar height, to position the router cutter on centre height, pivoting the router/ table was easy. Using the in-built lathe indexing mechanism and pivoting the toolpost table, I was able to cut a variety of patterns into the lip of a bowl or lid of a box. The choice of either a straight cutter, a v-grooving bit, or a round nose cove bit determines the look of the finished piece. Using a stiff, short-bristled nylon brush is good for getting rid of most of the 'hairies' on the sides of the routered grooves. (it cuts down finish sanding times a LOT). Every timber is different, but for quality work, a sharp cutter in the router is definitely essential.

Using a 60° V-grooving bit, and a couple of stops, and with the toolpost table locked, I then demonstrated how varying the depth of cut can completely change the look of, for example, the lid of a box. I did a few cuts at constant depth from the centre to the rim, a few cuts going from deep to shallow, and a few cuts going from shallow to deep radially across the piece. Each of the three samples looked completely different.



Most lathes have 24 positions on the in-built indexing mechanism, but sometimes that isn't enough. So, I have made a new acrylic disk with 48 equally-spaced holes around the circumference, with alternate holes numbered in black and red - to try to avoid indexing 'stuff-ups'. The disk is mounted on the spindle behind the chuck, making sure that the chuck is firmly tightened against the disk. It is VERY distressing if the acrylic index disk starts to slip during routing (Don't ask me how I know that!).

Most of the above relates to bowls... What about spindle turning?

I then explained about the acrylic nosecone follower that I mount above the router bit. When correctly adjusted, the follower allows for a constant cutting depth when doing what I call T.F.R. (The military call it Terrain-Following Radar...I call it Terrain-Following Routing). A quick demo of TFR, and I passed around a routered candlestick that I had made using that technique.



Routing parallel to the lathe bed is limiting, so then I showed and demonstrated a tilting table that allows the router to traverse a path at an angle to the top of the lathe bed.



As some of us do, I often scroll online, through Instagram and Facebook and other sites, looking for inspiration for new and interesting project ideas. I happened across a picture of Ruby Cler, the very talented Canadian turner, holding a routered platter. It tweaked my interest when I looked closer, and realised that it had been routered on the top face, AND on the bottom face, to create an interesting pattern, where the CURVED routered lines intersected. I said to myself, "That is really cool, I have to find out how to do something similar,"... And so my quest began.

After much research, (and assistance from Theo), I got a single photo of an assembly made in England by Paul Howard (same name, but not related). Once I examined it in detail, and worked out the mechanics of how it worked, I set about to make a better one!

It would be simple!...(Ha,Ha!)The router had to be able to rotate on a fixed pivot shaft to traverse an arc to cut a curved path, whilst moving along the shaft. The position of that shaft had to be adjustable, the radius of rotation (How far up the frame the router is positioned) had to be adjustable, the depth of cut had to be adjustable, ideally would have at least one adjustable stop to limit the traverse at the centre of the workpiece. AND the whole thing had to be mounted somehow on the bed of the lathe, whilst maintaining the ability to easily adjust any or all of the above variables! Rigidity of the whole assembly was very important to ensure nice clean router lines.

I have a personal hate of jigs that need a full kit of tools to set up and adjust. So I made all of the adjustable bits with either knobs or 'T' heads on the clamping bolts, but space constraints meant that one part does need a 5mm allen key to adjust it.

The jig is easier to use, the flatter that the platter is, and the finished pattern depends on the adjustment of any, or all, of the above variables. To achieve the desired look, the bottom of the platter is routered first, and the platter is then turned around, to router the top. Two challenges immediately came to mind: how to hold the platter on the top face to be able to rout the bottom, and then once turned around, how to make sure that the top routered lines will align exactly at the circumference, with the lines already on the bottom. At home during testing, I used a vacuum chuck to hold onto the centre boss on the top, whilst I routered the bottom. For the WSQ demonstration, I had prepared the blank with shallow tenons on both the top, and the bottom, so I could hold it both ways.


I then stressed the point, that for the double routing to be successful, the wall thickness of the platter must be as close as possible to the same measurement all the way from outside to the inside. To ensure clean 'cut through', the router depth should be set to 'just over' half the platter thickness.



I set up the demo platter and jig as described, and routered the underside, and all appeared ok. I then turned the platter around in the chuck, and carefully adjusted it so that the router lines would meet up. As I routered the top face, I realised that it was not cleanly cutting through at the inner end of each routered line... Damn! Too late to do anything about it. It would just mean a lot more cleanup to do with a sharp scalpel knife!

POSTSCRIPT

On re-checking the wall thickness of the platter after the event, I found that in fact I had a 0.4mm discrepancy in thickness from outside to inside of the platter. That was enough difference when the whole platter was nominally only 4.0mm thick! I put the platter back on the lathe at home, and with a LOT of adjusting, was able to get it to an acceptable finish. My Routing Journey has just begun!

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Design session - Knife block

Like most things in our life, the design process has changed significantly with the advent of the internet. A google search for an item reveals a multitude of

images, design options with numerous implementations. Simply pick one that appeals, modify a few dimensions and "your" design is done!

So we thought it would be a bit of fun to design a simple Knife block the old fashioned way, close the devices and start with a blank sheet of paper and your imagination. There were a lot of blank faces to match the page! So we asked ourselves a few questions to get the process under way:

Functional Requirements

- How many knives and what are their dimensions?
- Wall or bench mounted? How?
- Design concept bar, block, box, profiled draw, portable, lockable?
- Ergonomic issues?
- Magnetically or mechanically captured?

Aesthetic Requirements

- Style to be adopted? dimensions, proportions, form
- Single or double sided?
- Hidden or visible blade?
- Vertical, angled, or horizontal?
- Formal, rustic or natural edge ?
- Decorative additions, stringing, parquetry, borders

How to build it


- Magnetic, how many, strength etc?
- Joinery involved, hardware required?
- Tools necessary, jigs, order of build operations, glue-up, finish?
- Need for models, prototypes, mock-up?

The process soon gained momentum and plans for a diverse range of knife holders evolved. For such a simple item, so many potential solutions - time to check with the internet to further refine the evolving design.

Then it was time to build the concept and turn it into reality. Suitable timber was sourced, milled, joinery cut, build problems solved, items assembled and a finish applied.

These are some of the results

An inclined American oak block with inlaid kwilla strip to 'house' the knives. Slots custom built for knife collection and sharpening steel.



A magnetic knife strip mounted on the wall. A beautiful combination of maple and Huon pine delicately bordered with black stringing. The magnets are hidden behind the Huon 'veneer' which can be removed to access the fixing screws.





Being an exercise by Reg's box group, there had to be a double sided knife box, utilising dovetails and New Guinea rosewood.



Then there is the sculptured horizontal design, mounted on feet that are secured by sliding dovetails across the 'waves' that house the knives.



A couple of solutions that supported a 'special' single knife





Finally, a bit of a variation on the theme, a magnetic chiselled rack for the workshop.



It was a lot of fun; turning a diverse range of ideas into a purpose built item for each person's specific requirements. Well done everyone!

I know he loved his time and involvement with WSQ and the Library.


