



1. Minutes

The Minutes of the March meeting as presented were accepted as a true and accurate record.

2. Correspondence


The Inwards Correspondence was accepted and the Outwards Correspondence endorsed.

3. Finance

The Finance Report, including the monthly Profit & Loss Statement and Balance Sheet was presented and accepted and the Accounts passed for payment. The Treasurer raised the issue of the need to review the WSQ Insurances to ensure that we are adequately covered and the premiums appropriate. She also made reference to the review of the cost of our Energy bills as requested by AMSA and will report at a later meeting.

4. Membership

The Membership Secretary reported that current membership stands at 231. The Applications for



Membership from Liz du Plessis, Keith Flitcroft and Andrew Chamberlain were ratified.

### 5. Workplace Health & Safety

The Safety Officer, David Williams, reported on the issue of some tenons shearing off some bowl blanks. A further investigation will be carried out. He also reported on an issue of a saw blade breaking while being used by a member. The Accreditation status of this Member to use a bandsaw will be further researched.

### 6. Building and Grounds

A Grant submission is being prepared to defray costs with the painting of the outside of the building, as per the requirement of our lease. A resulting Cashflow situation may delay the installation of the Air-conditioning in the Auditorium for a few months.

The electrical check by Guardian revealed an issue with one of the Exit lights. Reg Weber is to look into its replacement.

The Annual termite inspection is due and scheduled for 14 th April.

### 7. Tools and Equipment

Graham Chen is to be asked to speak at a 'Smoko' meeting to acquaint Members with the proposed changes to the Sign on procedures which will involve the use of digital technology.

Reg Weber will schedule a Maintenance Monday for general lathe and chuck maintenance for early May.

John Carney prepared a report on the Sharpening Station innovation indicating that there was general widespread positive feedback from Members. However, there are still some issues with the

sharpening of bowl gouges resulting in a swept back grind and some multiple bevels. Some further training of Convenors on bowl gouges appears necessary. He also noted that one of the scrapers has now been sharpened with a French curve' instead of the traditional round nose curve.

Barry Wilson reported that a replacement of the standing drill press in the downstairs workshop has become a necessity, and he will obtain a range of quotes.

8. Events & Activities

The proposal for a Toy Group to operate on a Saturday morning was discussed with further canvassing of Member interest to be carried out.

The construction of the silky oak tables for the Children's Hospital is underway and Harold Wiltshire's efforts are to be commended. Some of the milling for the timber for the legs was done on Tuesday by the afternoon Box making group and some of the table top milling was done in Harold's own workshop.

Round 2 of the Introductory Woodturning Course is scheduled to start of Monday 28 th April. The 3

week Pen-making course is progressing well with 3 Members enjoying it. Belmont Planning is progressing with the publicity campaign about to go into full swing with our digital platforms and further support from our 3 local members.

# **Treasurer's Report**



Main earnings were from the Bunnings sausage sizzle on 1 March (\$2295 profit), and brokerage from the sale of a couple of lathes to club members (\$1540). Workshop fees were a bit down, which was to be expected with the closure for a week due to Cyclone Alfred.

Major expenses included the annual Association Liability Insurance premium (\$1075), advertising leaflets for the Belmont Showcase (\$399), and training course expenses (\$680).

Although it was a quieter day for us, it was still a great earner for the club. # **Community Table**

During the Covid pandemic, people association was not encouraged. At the Children Hospital Queensland, the furniture in the staff room was removed to prevent gatherings. Things have changed, and CHQ has embarked on a project to refurbish the common room for their staff to use again. As part of this project, WSQ was asked to provide a quotation to build two tables, central to their design. Our quotation has been accepted!

This was an exciting opportunity for our members to get involved in planning and building significant furniture items, but also to give back to the hospital staff for the amazing work they do every day for our children.


Our proposal was for a modern style table, with round end ends and matching legs (see below).



The proposed wood selection was Southern Silky Oak - endemic to the region and hopefully a reminder of the flowering trees across Brisbane in November.

We quickly discovered that suitable timber was not readily available in Brisbane, but we managed to identify an individual with a portable mill. He had cut up a large silky oak tree that had been hit by lightning. The timber had been sitting in his shed for 5 years so was dried and well seasoned.

The "box group" have adopted the project and have been working on the initial stages of the construction. Firstly, the rough sawn timber was milled to approximate dimensions and the boards allocated to their intended use in the table. The design called for semicircular legs. So the group set up a production line, milling 120 profiled strips



that interlock around the custom forms of the legs. Meanwhile, the boards allocated to the table top have been milled, cut to final dimension ready for the important (stressful) glue-up.


The two tables are 2.4 by 1.0 meters, so space at WSQ is an issue during the construction and more importantly for the final assembly/Finishing phases. We are working to have the tables installed by June. So watch your space!



The tree that became the timber for the tables.




the form for the legs and finally the slats in place to form the leg.





Our thoughts and prayers go to Tom's family at this time.




### Tom Rowston




Sandpaper Finishes & Glues we use to run this special program.


