

# A Brief History of Pyrography Painting with Fire

Pyrography is one of the oldest human art forms. As long as humans have been taming fire, they have been drawing with it. It used to be called pokerwork before the term pyrography came to be. Pyrography has a long and varied history. It is thought to have started in Egypt where it was used to decorate pottery and furniture. The practice then spread to Europe, where it was used to decorate furniture, musical instruments, and other items. In the 19th Century, the art form saw a resurgence in popularity and was used to decorate a variety of items. Pyrography became a popular art form to create detailed and intricate patterns. Today pyrography is used to decorate furniture, musical instruments, kitchenware and more.

The process has been used by a number of cultures including Egyptian and African tribes over many centuries. Robert Boyer, the famous pyrographer, says that the art started in pre-history when the artists used the charred remains from their fire. In the Middle Ages, pyrography was done with a portable wood stove with small holes for the pokers to rest in until they were hot enough. Artists would carry pokers, needles and knives with them to heat as needed. In China from the Han dynasty, it was known as 'fire needle embroidery'. During the Victorian era in Britain the invention of pyrography machines sparked a widespread interest in the art. This is when the term pyrography was first used. It comes from the Ancient Greek *pur* (fire) and *graphos* ( writing). It can be used with specialised pyrography tools, a metal implement heard in a fire or even with sunlight through a magnifying lens. There are examples of Western European pyrography from the 15th and 16th Centuries including decorative designs on musical instruments and richly ornamented wooden chests and coffers that can be found in various museums. According to the Sophienburg Museum in Texas, USA, a mechanical tool was invented around 1900 to make pyrography easier. In the 20th Century the development of hot wire electric pyrography, called a wood etching machine, further automated the pokerwork process.

The craft of pyrography enjoyed a surge of popularity in 1880's and 1920's. Young adults were encouraged to keep their hands busy and make small craft projects to beautify their homes. Books and magazines published designs and patterns. Kits became available through mail order catalogues. Over the last few years it has become a more popular art form due to the relaxing effect of the process.
